RETIREMENT PLAN FOR THE POLICE OFFICERS OF THE CITY OF GULF BREEZE

ACTUARIAL VALUATION AS OF OCTOBER 1, 2016

DETERMINES THE CONTRIBUTION FOR THE 2017/18 FISCAL YEAR



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March 7, 2017

Introduction

This report presents the results of the October 1, 2016 actuarial valuation for the Retirement Plan for the Police Officers of the City of Gulf Breeze. The report is based on the participant data and asset information provided by the pension plan administrator and, except for a cursory review for reasonableness including a comparison to the data provided for the previous valuation, we have not attempted to verify the accuracy of this information.

The primary purpose of this report is to provide a summary of the funded status of the plan as of October 1, 2016 and to determine the minimum required contribution under Chapter 112, Florida Statutes, for the 2017/18 plan year. In addition, this report provides a projection of the long-term funding requirements of the plan, statistical information concerning the assets held in the trust, statistical information concerning the participant population, and a summary of any recent plan changes.

The liabilities and cost presented in this report are based on numerous assumptions concerning the cost of benefits to be provided in the future, long-term investment returns, and the future demographic experience of the current participants. Anyone referring to this report should remember that the cost developed herein is only an <u>estimate</u> of the true cost of providing post-employment pension benefits. No one can predict with certainty whether the true cost will be higher or lower than the cost presented in this report. The calculated cost is entirely dependent upon the assumptions that are described in Table IV-A. If any of the assumptions is changed, then the cost shown in this report will change accordingly. Likewise, if any of the assumptions is not completely realized, then the cost shown in this report will change in the future.

Certain assumptions play a bigger role than others in determining the cost of the post-employment pension benefits. In some cases, relatively small changes in a particular assumption can have a dramatic impact on the anticipated cost of benefits. Although a thorough analysis of the impact of such changes is beyond the scope of this report, Table I-B illustrates the impact that alternative long-term investment returns would have on the normal cost rate.

Minimum Required Contribution

Table I-A shows the development of the minimum required contribution for the 2017/18 plan year. The minimum required contribution rate is 24.86% of covered payroll, which represents a decrease of 5.49% of payroll from the prior valuation.

The normal cost rate is 25.25%, which is 4.05% lower than the normal cost rate that was developed in the prior valuation. Table I-C provides a breakdown of the sources of change in the normal cost rate. Significantly, the rate decreased by 0.71% of payroll due to investment gains, decreased by another 4.61% of payroll due to demographic experience, and increased by 1.27% of payroll due to the assumption change that is described below. The market value of assets earned 8.30% during the 2015/16 plan year, whereas a 7.00% annual investment return was required



to maintain a stable contribution rate. The demographic gain occurred primarily because pensionable earnings decreased substantially from the previous year.

Chapter 112, Florida Statutes, sets forth the rules concerning the minimum required contribution for public pension plans within the state. Essentially, the City must contribute an amount equal to the annual normal cost of the plan plus an adjustment as necessary to reflect interest on any delayed payment of the contribution beyond the valuation date. On this basis, the City's 2017/18 minimum required contribution will be equal to 24.86% multiplied by the total pensionable earnings for the 2017/18 plan year for the active employees who are covered by the plan and reduced by the portion of the Chapter 175/185 contribution that is allowed to be recognized during the 2017/18 plan year. As of the date of this report, the allowable portion of the Chapter 175/185 contribution is \$58,434 per year.

Based on the current assets, participant data, and actuarial assumptions and methods that are used to value the plan, the present-day value of the total long-term funding requirement is \$6,207,438. As illustrated in Table I-A, current assets are sufficient to cover \$4,120,857 of this amount, the employer's 2016/17 expected contribution will cover \$188,600 of this amount, the employer's 2017/18 expected contribution will cover \$160,645 of this amount, and future employee contributions are expected to cover \$285,392 of this amount, leaving \$1,451,944 to be covered by future employer funding beyond the 2017/18 fiscal year. Again, demographic and investment experience that differs from that assumed will either increase or decrease the future employer funding requirement.

Excess Chapter 175/185 Contributions

As of October 1, 2016, the plan has accumulated excess Chapter 175/185 contributions of \$31,152 as shown in Table II-F. This amount is equal to the \$22,442 accumulated excess Chapter 175/185 contribution balance as of October 1, 2015 plus \$8,710 of Chapter 175/185 distribution in excess of the allowable amount. The total Chapter 175/185 distribution received during the 2015/16 plan year was \$67,144, \$58,434 of which was allowed to be used to offset the City's minimum required contribution. Tables II-G and II-H provide a history of the Chapter 175/185 contributions and the portion that is allowed to be recognized.

Advance Employer Contribution

The City has made contributions to the plan in excess of the minimum amount that was required to be contributed pursuant to Chapter 112. In this report, the excess contributions are referred to as an "advance employer contribution." As of October 1, 2016, the advance employer contribution is \$13,756, which reflects the advance employer contribution of zero as of October 1, 2015 plus \$13,756 which was contributed in excess of the minimum required contribution for the 2015/16 plan year as shown in Table II-F.

The City may apply all or any portion of the advance employer contribution towards the minimum required contribution for the 2016/17 plan year or for any later plan year. The minimum required contribution for that plan year will be reduced dollar-for-dollar by the amount of the advance employer contribution that is applied in this manner.



Alternatively, at any time, the City may apply all or any portion of the advance employer contribution as an <u>extra</u> contribution in excess of the minimum required contribution. In this case, the immediate application of the entire balance of the advance employer contribution as of October 1, 2016 would reduce the normal cost rate to 25.05% of payroll and would reduce the minimum required contribution for the 2017/18 plan year to 24.65% of payroll.

Contents of the Report

Tables I-D through I-G provide a detailed breakdown of various liability amounts by type of benefit and by participant group. Tables II-A through II-F provide information concerning the assets of the trust fund. Specifically, Table II-A shows the development of the actuarial value of assets, which is based on the market value adjusted to reflect any excess Chapter 175/185 contributions and advance employer contributions. Tables III-A through III-G provide statistical information concerning the plan's participant population. In particular, Table III-G gives a 10-year projection of the cash that is expected to be required from the trust fund in order to pay benefits to the current group of participants. Finally, Tables IV-A through V-B provide a summary of the actuarial assumptions and methods that are used to value the plan's benefits and of the relevant plan provisions as of October 1, 2016, as well as a summary of the changes that have occurred since the previous valuation report was prepared.

Refund of Participant Contributions

It is our understanding that there are six participants who are due a refund of their employee contributions. We have estimated the accumulated amount of their refunds to be \$3,486 as of October 1, 2016. The average amount owed is \$581. If possible, we recommend that the accumulated contributions be distributed to these individuals in order to simplify the administration of the plan and to reduce future administrative costs.

Assumption Change

Pursuant to the requirements of State law, the mortality basis has been changed from a 2015 projection of the RP-2000 Mortality Table for annuitants to a full generational projection using Scale BB of the RP-2000 Blue Collar Mortality Table. This change increased the minimum required contribution for the 2017/18 plan year by 1.35% of payroll.

Certification

This actuarial valuation was prepared by me or under my direct supervision and I acknowledge responsibility for the results. To the best of my knowledge, the results are complete and accurate and, in my opinion, the techniques and assumptions used are reasonable and meet the requirements and intent of Chapter 112, Florida Statutes. There is no benefit or expense to be provided by the plan and/or paid from the plan's assets for which liabilities or current costs have not been established or otherwise taken into account in the valuation. All known events or trends which may require a material change in plan costs or required contribution rates have been taken into account in the valuation.






The minimum required contribution rate of 24.86% includes both the City contribution and the allowable Chapter 185 contribution. In addition, employees are required to contribute 4.00% of pensionable earnings. The actual City contribution rate is expected to be approximately 15.82% based on the allowable Chapter 185 contribution for the previous year. The chart below shows the expected contribution rate by source for the 2017/18 plan year based on the expected payroll. 

NOTE: The following assumptions and methods have been selected and approved by the Board of Trustees based in part on the advice of the plan's enrolled actuary in accordance with the authority granted to the Board under the pension ordinances and State law.

1. Actuarial Cost Method

Aggregate cost method. Under this actuarial cost method, a funding cost is developed for the plan as a level percentage of payroll. The level funding percentage is calculated as the excess of the total future benefit liability over accumulated assets and future employee contributions, with this excess spread over the expected future payroll for current active participants. The normal cost is equal to the level funding percentage multiplied by the expected payroll for the year immediately following the valuation date. The actuarial accrued liability is equal to the accumulated assets. Therefore, under the aggregate cost method, no unfunded accrued liability is developed.

2. Asset Method

The actuarial value of assets is equal to the market value of assets.

3. Interest (or Discount) Rate

7.00% per annum

Salary Increases

Plan compensation is assumed to increase at the rate of 4.00% per annum, unless actual plan compensation is known for a prior plan year.

5. Decrements

Pre-retirement mortality: None assumed

Post-retirement mortality: Sex-distinct rates set forth in the RP-2000 Blue Collar Mortality Table, with

full generational improvements in mortality using Scale BB

Disability: None assumed

Termination: None assumed

Retirement: Retirement is assumed to occur at normal retirement age.

Prior to February 4, 2014, Compensation includes total cash remuneration, including overtime pay, but excluding amounts paid for extra duty and special detail work performed for a secondary party; after February 3, 2014, Compensation includes only base pay; annual compensation in excess of \$200,000 (as indexed) is excluded in accordance with Internal Revenue Code (IRC) §401(a)(17).

Credited Service

The elapsed time from the participant's date of hire until his date of termination, retirement, or death.
